Do Your Homework. Know who's providing your care.

While many health care providers offer dermatologic care and cosmetic procedures, the results depend on the provider's skill and experience.

The American Academy of Dermatology supports physician-led care teams, and recognizes the important roles that physician assistants and nurse practitioners play when caring for patients under the direction of a board-certified dermatologist. We recommend that you do your homework; know the qualifications of the provider you are considering.
